
WELCOME TO ALABAMA!

HIT RECORDING CAPITOL OF THE WORLD

In the music triangle with Memphis and Nashville, the south of it is Muscle Shoals. This is where the famous Muscle Shoals Sound was born. The Swampers were two men who produced their own sound that connected different music streams and people. You can visit Fame Studios and the Muscle Shoals Sound Recording Studios here. Big stars like Aretha Franklin, The Rolling Stones, Lynyrd Skynerd, Rod Stewart came here to record great hits in the 1960s. Wild Horses is even written on the toilet and it feels special to be here. Also, don't forget to visit the Alabama Music Hall of Fame.





BIGGEST HISTORY OF BIRMINGHAM

Birmingham is Alabama's largest city, right in the center of the Civil Rights Movement. In the Civil Rights Institute you can impressively follow and experience all of history. The museum is located in the heart of the Birmingham Civil Rights District, designated a National Monument by Obama. Here is also the 16th Baptist Church, where you can attend a Sunday morning service and Kelly Ingram Park. Here is even a memorial of Anne Frank. But you can also enjoy the Barber Vintage Motorsports Museum where you can find the largest private collection of cars and motorcycles.







ROCKET CITY USA

Huntsville is a charming town in Northern Alabama and is the birthplace of the moon travels. Named one of 52 places to visit (one per week) in 2019 by New York Times. Werner von Braun developed the Saturn V rocket that formed the basis for the Apollo missions. The US Space & Rocket Center is the world's largest museum on the theme of space travel. You can admire an original Saturn V rocket and the capsule of the Apollo 16. In 2019, it will be the 50th anniversary of the Apollo 11. There are also many fun attractions for children.

Space Camp


You will also find Space Camp on the grounds of US Space & Rocket Center. They offer multi-day educational programs for children, adults and families. It attracts visitors from all over the world who can train like an astronaut and have a lot of fun. The New York Times calls it the # 1 Seriously Cool Summer Camp.



CIVIL RIGHTS CIRCLE

We start in Montgomery, a real Southern city. It is the capital of Alabama on the Alabama River. Montgomery has by far the most historical sites associated with the Civil War and Civil Rights. This is where Martin Luther King preached, which led to the founding of the Civil Rights Movement in America. You can go to the Rosa Parks museum, the woman who refused to get up to go to the back of the bus. This led to a year-long boycott of the bus company. The Alabama State Capitol demonstrated for voting rights.

Selma is about 80 kilometers away. Known from the Selma to Montgomery Civil Rights Mars. A beautiful museum shows the entire history. Getting in the mood? Then watch the film Selma, highly recommended.





RELAXING IN THE GULF OF MEXICO

Alabama has over 50 miles of white sand beach on the Gulf Shore and Orange Beach. This in combination with crystal clear water from the Gulf of Mexico. Visit the famous Flora-Bama Bar where live music is played daily. You can also recommend a visit to this coast with delicious fish restaurants, shopping malls and the Gulf State Park.


FROM MOBILE TO BAYOU LA BATRE






HOW YOU COME IN ALABAMA

Alabama is centrally located in the South of the USA and therefore a short distance from many iconic cities in the region.

Alabama can be perfectly combined with a tour that starts in Nashville, Memphis and ends in New Orleans or vice versa.

You'll be in Alabama via Atlanta in Georgia. Birmingham is only 237 kilometers west. New Orleans to Mobile is about the same distance, as is Nashville to Muscle Shoals. From the International airports you can also easily start your trip in Alabama. Birmingham and Montgomery also have airports you can fly to.






